Why GambLIB?

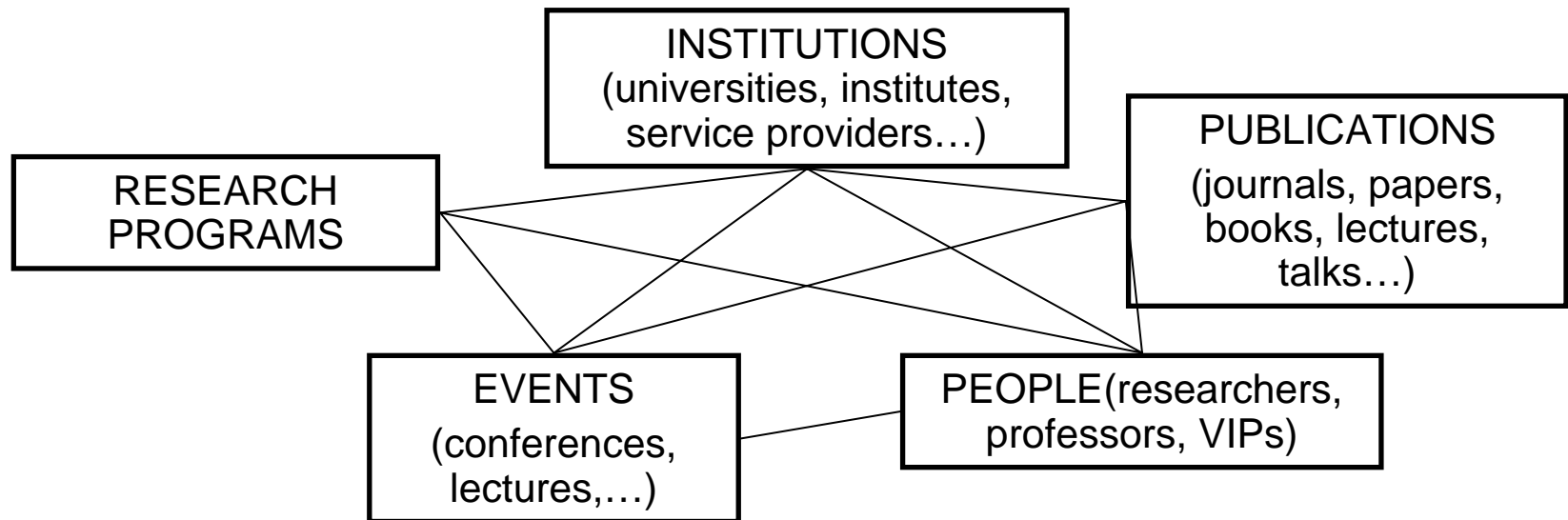


- Fast growth of gambling industry:
 - Many positive economic effects
 - Lots of negative effects for the society and individuals
- Future trends should be planned such that the drawbacks are minimal
- We need to explore all existing knowledge
 - From relevant scientific bibliography
 - By stimulating communication between all players in this area
 - By participating and promoting scientific and other events covering gambling
- The data from above is available in wide range of databases which are not synchronized
 - Hard to search for the data
 - Hard to stay up-to-date with the latest results

The objectives of GambLIB



- Free web data archive covering results from gambling research
- GambLIB will contain the following data

Main objective of GambLIB

GambLIB aims to become (within one or two years)
a global reference data archive covering gambling

How?

- By offering up-to-date picture of the gambling society.
- By collecting systematically the data from existing bibliographic datasets, electronic journals, web presentations,....
- By motivating the people from gambling research society to publish latest results in GambLIB.
- By offering all important data on one web address
- By simple and easy to use web page.

Underlying Cognitions in Gambling Behavior Among University Students

- **authors:** Hayley R. Baboushkin, Jefferey L. Derevensky, Rina Gupta, Karen K. Haroon

- **summary:** Differences in underlying cognitions across gambling tasks were examined. The South Oaks Gambling Screen, a measure of pathological gambling, was completed by 60 undergraduate students. They also played computer-simulated games of roulette, slots, and blackjack in a laboratory setting. The "think-aloud" procedure was used to reveal subjects' cognitions, which were subsequently categorized into cognitive heuristics. Individuals were classified as social gamblers with and without problems and probable pathological gamblers. Results reveal that certain heuristics, including references to an explanation of their losses, hindsight bias, personification of the dealer/machine, chasing behavior, and past experiences were most frequently endorsed by probable pathological gamblers. Empirical evidence supports that probable pathological gamblers are qualitatively different from social gamblers in their emitted verbalized cognitive heuristics.

What can affective neuroscience teach us about gambling?

For the past 25 years, Jaak Panksepp, professor of psychology at Bowling Green State University, has waged a sometimes lonely battle against the purveyors of what he calls "neurobehaviorism." In his opinion, behavioral neuroscientists have simply replaced the environmental orientation of classic behaviorists, like Watson and Skinner, with a neurochemical orientation. In each case, the living being is essentially a "scarecrow" that responds to stimuli. The subjective experience of that living being is granted little if any importance because it cannot be empirically verified or tested. In the quest for objectivity, neuroscientists—like behaviorists before them—have eschewed the fundamental issue of consciousness. Panksepp believes that this has impeded progress in our understanding and treatment of many forms of psychopathology, and particularly those that involve disturbances in motivation, such as addiction.

GambLIB portal – plan for the future

- Database
 - Developing the data model:
 - Detailed information about people and institutions
 - Information about programs and events
 - Enabling extensive search (drilling-down, controlling the links)
 - Data: updating the database with new entries
- Web portal
 - Establishing relations with other databases (to provide simple access to the data)
 - Enabling on-line publishing by (registered) authors.
 - Every new entry must be approved by administrator.
